





(Outside Velos's office)


Lynne: (monologue) *I don't want to win this way.* Now, have I read a story of a sheepdog in a flood anywhere?

Setting

- Time Present and a few school days
- **Place** School (classroom, corridor and headmaster's office)

Exposition

Headmaster Velos announces that Geoff is the winner of the short story competition. Lynne is disappointed but composes herself and congratulates Geoff.



Conflict

Lynne keeps her feelings of disappointment under control though everything tasted like cardboard that night. She goes about her school activities as usual. She abandons her story in a drawer.



Climax

Lynne comes across a Bradburie story of an escaped elephant's antics in a park. She prickles with anger and assumes Geoff has cheated. She wants to expose him but does not know how best



"... elephant running in park ..." The cheat!!?

Falling Action


After a class discussion about careers, Lynne inadvertently mentions the name 'Bradburie' to Geoff. Later, Lynne is called to Velos's office. Geoff is there. The trophy and a Bradburie book are on Velos's table.



Resolution

Geoff's explanation that story may not be original is accepted. He is not disqualified but loses the first place to Lynne. The latter is not happy to win the competition this way. She begins to doubt the originality of her own story.





Characters

Lynne Webbings

- Competitive, impatient and anxious while waiting for results of competition
- Second place winner in short story competition
- Disappointed but keeps her emotions in check
- Comes across Bradburie's story about an elephant assumes Geoff cheated
- Unintentionally makes Geoff aware of the situation
- Feels upset when she replaces Geoff as first place winner
- Loses self-confidence that her story may not be original too



Geoff Bolder

- Winner of short story competition
- Sense of humour jokes with Lynne about how winner is picked
- Wants to be a lawyer not a writer
- Honest admits his story might not be original
- Courageous tells Velos the truth
- Not disqualified but placed second after Lynne



Headmaster Velos

- Headmaster of Geoff and Lynne's school announces result of competition
- Embarrassed about issue that Geoff's story may not be original
- Fair in dealing with issue of short story
- Does not disqualify Geoff but awards Lynne first place winner
- Apologetic towards Geoff and Lynne


Chandler and Marian go their separate ways. Both feel disappointed. Chandler watches her sadly.

Setting

<u>lime</u>

- Early 20th century in New York
- Evening to night

<u>Place</u>

- New York city Chandler's rented room
- A street corner Chandler runs into Marian
- An expensive restaurant Chandler and Marian dine together
- Marian's room in her house

Exposition

Chandler is all set for his expensive once-inten-weeks night out. Mrs Black and Jeff White are surprised to see this. Chandler collides with Marian who is dressed in an old hat and coat at a street corner.



Conflict

Marian falls down and Chandler helps her up. To help her recover from her hurt ankle, he invites her to dine with him. She agrees after they have introduced themselves.



Climax

They have a good dinner and while having coffee, Chandler tells Marian he is a do-nothing guy and has no need to work. Marian is disappointed to hear this.



Falling Action


After dinner, Chandler and Marian go their separate ways. Chandler regrets not telling Marian the truth about himself while Marian is disappointed with Chandler's way of life.



Resolution

Marian tells Sissie that though they are expected to marry rich men, she prefers someone who has proper work.






Point of View

• Third person point of view

Tone, Mood and Atmosphere

- Humorous, appealing
- Casual to intimate



Moral Values

- Be happy with what you have and do not crave for what you don't have.
- Plan and budget for things you wish for.
- Be honest with others about ourselves.
- We should not do things merely to satisfy our ego.
- Take note of our status in society and rise beyond it through hard work.
- Adopt the right attitude towards family, friends and situations.

Literary Devices

Irony

- It is an irony that Chandler, an office worker is dressed like a wealthy man while Marian, from a wealthy family is dressed like a poor shop girl.
- They like each other but are put off by their mistaken impression of each other's status.

Rhetorical question

•'A shop girl, perhaps? Why didn't I tell her the true story of my life?'

Repetition

• 'You're crazy' is repeated by Jeff White to Chandler and by Sissie to Marian to express their disbelief in the other's beliefs.

Imagery

• ' .. live like a man with a million dollars'

Characters

Towers Chandler

- A friendly, easy-going and kind office worker lives in a rented room
- Has a penchant for enjoying life saves a dollar a week for ten weeks to spend a night like a wealthy man
- Dresses like a wealthy man and dines in a high-end restaurant
- Meets Marian at a street corner invites her to dinner
- Pretends to be a rich do-nothing guy
- Regrets for not telling Marian the truth about his situation





Marian

- A wealthy girl who is expected to marry into a rich family
- Meets Chandler after a collision with him, hurts her ankle and agrees to have dinner with him
- Chandler mistakes her as a shop girl because of her old coat
- Disappointed with Chandler's portrayal of himself as a rich do-nothing
- · Would like to marry a hard-working guy even if he is poor

Sissie

- Marian's sister who is respectful of family status and understands family's marriage plans for them
- Finds it unbelievable that Marian is willing to marry a poor but hard-working man







Mrs Black

• Chandler's landlady who is surprised that Chandler is set for an expensive night in town when he has not paid his room rent.

Jeff White

- Chandler's friend who earns eighteen dollars a week and spends every dollar of his pay.
- Laughs at Chandler's idea of living like a millionaire once every ten weeks.
