








VERB TO BE


sub + wasn't/weren't

sub + verb in simple past


sub + did not + verb in base form

## THE PAST CONTINUOUS is used to


- talk about actions in progress at a time in the past
  - Rubina was cooking in the kitchen all day yesterday.



• Carmen was doing the dishes while I was wiping the dining table.



THE PAST CONTINUOUS



sub + was/were + verb-ing

sub + was/were + not + verb-ing

was/were + sub + verb-ing? "o v.v v"





to show that an action was interrupted by another action in the past.

Ithe action of cooking was the action in progress whilst the phone ringing was the action. I action which interrupted the ongoing action.

#### USED TO/ DIDN'T USE TO

to talk about habitual actions that happened in the past but no longer happen in the present (or vice-versa)

I used to like onde-onde but I find
 them too sweet now.


- Did you use to drink a glass of milk for breakfast?

#### GET USED TO


to describe getting accustomed to something or doing something




 Has Ganesh gotten used to cooking for himself?
