





From Street Busker to Global Stardom

He is among the best selling music artists across the globe. Among his notable songs are "Perfect", "Shape of You" and "Castle on the Hill". Edward Christopher Sheeran who is better known as Ed Sheeran was born on 17 February, 1991, in Halifax, West Yorkshire. Then the family moved to Fralingham, Suffolk where he spent most of his childhood. He comes from a family who loves art and music. His parents are in the art world and his elder brother, Matthew is a classical music composer.

From a young age he was encouraged to be in music. He started to join the church choir at the age of four and learned the cello before starting the guitar at eleven years old. Along the years he also picked up the piano, bass and drums. He dabbled in songwriting when he went to high school.

His first ever performance happened quite accidentally. It was meant to be a duo. His friend, Dan was supposed to play the piano. Unfortunately, things didn't happen according to plan. They couldn't bring the piano on stage. So, the duo performance turned to a solo performance with Ed singing alone on the stage.

Although he felt nervous, he went ahead with the performance. When it was over, he was pleasantly surprised to know that people thought he was good. It was the day the 11 year-old realised that he could do something with it. He started busking and performing in London at the age of 18. In his "Photograph" music video, fans are given a rare glimpse into his childhood in a montage of videos. This home-movie video clip also included Sheeran busking on the street during his early days as a new artist.

He continued to push forward and in 2004, he started recording his music independently with his first collection of songs called the "Spinning Man". He went on to release more songs. His big break came when he signed with Atlantic Records in 2011. Sheeran first album titled '+' (Plus) was released in September 2011. The album went platinum six times! It shot him to superstardom and internationally well known. In 2012, he went on to win the Brit Awards for British Breakthrough Act and British Solo Male Artist. Sheeran's star continues to soar in the music industry. He has composed over 120 songs to date and released six albums. There is no stopping this man and his unruly ginger hair.

A robotic fish to spy on ocean life

It looks like a fish. But, it isn't a fish. It's SoFi, the robotic fish. Developed by researchers at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, SoFi is a soft-bodied robot that glides silently through the water with a smooth, undulating motion designed to mimic the movements of real fish.

It is the first robotic fish to contend with the currents and pressures of an actual ocean setting for an extended period of time. It can nimbly navigate a coral reef in Fiji in three dimensions, swimming up, down, left, right and forward, all at the behest of a diver armed with Nintendo controller. It can handle water depths of about 18.2m and appears to swim alongside real fish without spooking them.

SoFi is a fairly small robot, about 45cm long and weighing at just 1.5kg, a hydraulic pump moves water in its soft rubber tail from side to side, allowing it to swim in a fish-like motion. Electronics, along with a fisheye lens, are stored in the robot's head. It runs off a small battery and in its current situation, it can swim for about 40 minutes at a time. Many of SoFi's parts are 3D printed, making it relatively easy and inexpensive to reproduce. The design of SoFi can be easily scaled up or down. But, if it were bigger, it would be harder for a diver to get it into and out of the water and if it were smaller, it would struggle to move more against currents.

What's killing the coral reefs?

Reefs are home to millions of animals – at least 25 percent of all fish species. They have become known as rainforests of the sea. However, worldwide half of all reefs have vanished. So, what's killing the coral reefs?



Overfishing

Increasing demand for fish has led to the overfishing of reef species. Overfishing of certain species can easily affect the ecological balance and biodiversity of the reef.

Destructive fishing methods

Dynamite fishing and cyanide make the fish easier to catch. These practices do not target species, they destroy everything where they are applied. Damage on the coral reef affects the entire reef ecosystem, and thus has an immediate impact on the livelihood of fishermen.

Pollution

Pollution from land-based human activities – smother coral reefs, depriving them of sunlight and nutrients. Also, fish are unable to feed and coral polyps are unable to grow, leaving the area inhospitable to reef life.

Rising ocean temperature

If the ocean surface temperatures continue to rise, the frequency and severity of coral bleaching will also increase, possibly affecting the ability of coral reefs to multiply.

Increased tourism

Increased tourism is one of the major causes of the destruction of coral reefs. Careless tourist behaviour - divers, snorkelers, and other sea lovers often inadvertently damage the reef by playing on them, stepping or sitting on them to rest, or simply by touching them.

Boats and other vessels used for recreational activities can damage coral reefs with carelessly dropped anchors or accidental grounding.

Escape from Deadly Volcano Eruption

It was a day that Andang Larasti would not forget. It was the day Mount Semeru which stands at 3,676 metres is the tallest volcano in Java erupted in December 2021. Indonesia, an archipelago of 270 million people, is nestled on the "Ring of Fire" which is a band around the Pacific Ocean that triggers frequent earthquakes and volcanic activity. There are 129 active volcanoes within this archipelago.

Andang has lived at the foot of this active volcano since childhood. It was the only home she ever knew. It never crossed her mind to uproot her family to a safer area because all of her other family members and relatives lived here. However, this farmer was forced to leave her village in Kamar Kajang when the volcano suddenly erupted on 4th December.

Initially she thought it was just a regular flood. Instead it rained gravel and ash. Then the sky darkened. This dire situation had propelled Andang, her husband and their 9-year-old son to leave the house with flashlights at 4:30p.m. They had to leave all their livestock behind.

Andang also heard that one of the villagers had his house completely destroyed razed to the ground. She also heard that houses in Renteng village were submerged in four metres high of lava, ash and sand. Renteng was one the worst area affected by this volcanic eruption.

The volcano ejected thick volcanic ash more than 4,000 feet into the air and dangerous lava flowed down the slopes toward the Besuk Kobokan river which was eight miles from the crater. Andang and her family were among 3,697 evacuees from the Lumajang area who seek shelter at the 19 temporary evacuation centres set up by the National Disaster Management Agency. Authorities had estimated about 100,000 homes were destroyed or partially damaged.

It was weeks before Andang and her family were allowed to return home. They were devastated to see everything in the village was covered in thick ash, lava and sand. She saw that nothing could be salvage at home and so it was the very last time she set eyes on her village.



Turtles of Peninsular Malaysia

Malaysia is fortunate to host four species of marine turtles: Leatherback, Green, Hawksbill and Olive Ridley turtles. The Leatherback and Hawksbill have been classified as Critically Endangered, Green and Olive Ridley sea turtles have been classified as Endangered.

Did you know?

- One of the earth's most ancient creatures, sea turtles once navigated the world's oceans in huge numbers. But, in the past century, human demand for turtle meat, eggs, skin and colourful shells have reduced their populations. Destruction of feeding and nesting habitats and pollution of the world's oceans are all taking a serious toll on remaining sea turtle population.
- Many breeding population have already become extinct and some surviving species are being threatened to extinction.
- The natural obstacles faced by sea turtles are staggering, but it is the increasing problems caused by humans that are threatening their future survival. They are facing unprecedented threats and the number of sea turtles in most places has plummeted.
- Sea turtles are classic travellers These great gentle reptiles of the sea swim great distances and come on land only to nest. Leatherback sea turtles can travel more than 16,093km every year!
- For sea turtles, home is where the heart is Sea turtles return to the same nesting ground where they were born, to lay their eggs. They use a simple navigation system involving the earth's magnetic field to return to the same egg-laying site.
- Sea turtles are natural divers Leatherbacks can dive to a depth of more than 1000m in search of their prey, jellyfish. They are adapted to deep dives.
- Sea turtle can hold their breath for hours Sea turtles are air-breathing reptiles so they need to surface to breathe. However, they can hold their breath for several hours depending on the level of activity. A resting or sleeping turtle can remain underwater between four to seven hours.

But we were pretty deep in the countryside surrounded by crowing roosters. Many old-time residents here lived a languorous life. Mobile signals are non-existent and congestion on the road was more likely to be caused by cows than cars. A little shack of a washroom was located behind the house.

It took a bit of getting used to the charming kampung life but in hindsight it was a great experience. We got to observe traditional Javanese culture and heritage and experienced the local delicacies. And over at Kampung Pelegong, our group participated in a cultural performance that included a wedding ceremony that observed the Adat Perpatih (matrilineal system). When we arrived at Kampung Lonek in Jempol, the sight of the golden paddy fields provided a welcome change from tall city buildings.
