

Word and Pronunciation



- This word is often mispronounced as fete-gra-fuh

 The correct pronunciation of the word photographer fuh-TOG-ruh-fuh

 A good photographer takes photographs that tell a story. fe'-tb-gref
- This word is often mispronounced as *bu-fet*The correct pronunciation of the word buffet *bu-FAY*Buffet will be served after the meeting has ended. I' bot et
- This word is often mispronounced as buh-ree
 The correct pronunciation of the word bury BEH-ree
 The dog found a good spot under the tree to bury its bone. / beri/
- This word is often mispronounced as sa-laad

 The correct pronunciation of the word salad SAL-uhd

 The buffet includes a range of salad and fruits for the vegetarians. I'sæləd/
- This word is often mispronounced as let-tius

 The correct pronunciation of the word lettuce LET-is

 The Koreans usually serve their barbecued chicken wrapped with lettuce. | letis|
- This word is often mispronounced as deh-bree

 The correct pronunciation of the word Debris DAY-bri

 The town council workers are clearing the debris left behind by the flood. /debri:/
- This word is often mispronounced as *vej-i-TAY-buhl*The correct pronunciation of the word Vegetable *VEJ-te-bel*It is unhealthy not to include vegetable in your daily diet. I' ved3.tə.bl /
- This word is often mispronounced as cha-luht

 The correct pronunciation of the word chalet SHAL-ayz

 The accommodation at the resort includes hotel rooms and chalet. I' [æl.eɪ/
- This word is often mispronounced as *cha-os*The correct pronunciation of the word Chaos *KAY-os*After the earthquake, everything was in a state of chaos. I'kei.ps/

What are homophones?

What do you call a piece of wood that has nothing to do?



Homophones are words that have the same pronunciation but have different spellings.

It's called a board.

The homophones are **board** and **bored**.

- **board** a piece of wood
- bored feeling tired and unhappy because you have nothing to do
